


As an Italian I adore the sunshine, so feel there's nothing better than soaking up some rays as I soak up some culture.





For the best indoor art and culture, check out John Ryland's Library.


When you step inside, you would be forgiven for thinking that you had stepped into the court of King Arthur or a great cathedral, with its grand Neo-gothic stone work.

NEWCASTLE

The British national story is tied to India in so many ways – and has led to the creation of some unmissable cultural curiosities. 
It's by appointment only, but is well worth making time to climb the 164 steps to see unrivalled views of the historial city.

YORKSHIRE

This part of the UK is also home to some original open air art galleries, including Yorkshire Sculpture Park, displaying the very best of modern and contemporary sculptures. Or for something quirkier, you could try a walk around one of the most famous landmarks in North Yorkshire, the Kilburn White Horse, a giant chalk figure on a hillside dating back to 1857.

It's a labyrinth collection of tunnels which stretch far underground, follies tucked away in foliage above ground, and even a pyramid of translucent glass. It is very weird. Very British. And very, very good.

The locals seem to be immune to its charm as it's so nearby – but is an incredible experience if you take the time to really see its sights.


COUNTY ANTRIM AND COUNTY DERRY/LONDONDERRY



1. Cushendun Caves, County Antrim

The scene in which the magical Melisandre gave birth to a shadow baby was filmed here. It's less spooky without her there though, so is well worth a visit.

2. Ballintoy Harbour, County Antrim

The picturesque harbour has been used as a location for the Iron Islands and exterior Greyjoy Kingdom of Pyke shots. It is featured in the scene in which Theon Greyjoy arrives back in the Iron Islands and meets his sister Yara. **Explore at:** discovernorthernireland.com

3. Castle Ward, Down Patrick

This gorgeous Georgian farmyard was the backdrop for many of the scenes that took place in Winterfell. Including the battle with Baelor, key scenes at Robb Stark's camp, and Brienne's confrontation with Stark men.

Tollymore has been a big part of Game of Thrones since day one. Literally! This beautiful space featured in the very first episode when Ned Stark finds direwolf puppies that became important to the series overall.

1. Holburne Museum of Art, Bath

2. No.1 Bath Royal Crescent & Assembly Rooms

The Georgian Crescent features as the front of the Featherington's residence as well as countless other period dramas including Vanity Fair (2004) and The Duchess (2008). The Assembly Rooms appear in the drama for ballroom scenes.
